Message from Your President


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Membership Rosalie Gray

The Gift of Love

Making a quilt for another person can be a long and emotional process for me, as I rarely give a quilt away. I find them precious to me. I take my work so personally that anyone that has gotten one surely must know that they are just as special to me.

Aside from the usual planning of a quilt, I make a point to do a couple things. *First* I make sure I am thinking of that person (sometimes, to the point of excluding all other thought) at all stages of the process, and *second*, I make the quilt something that shows how I see that person. On some quilts (for my husband for example) I would intertwine colors representing the interconnectedness of the relationship or even make a double-sided quilt. One about the recipient and one about me.

Thinking of that person may seem silly but to me it feels like I am infusing the fabric, stitches, and layers with my thoughts. In a way it's like I am giving the gift of my emotions to that person. *If the emotion is parental love*, then in some ways I would like to think that the quilt could keep all the bad dreams away or to make all the scraped knees feel better. *If the quilt was for a friend*, then all the shared camaraderie and depth of friendship would be there for the times when they felt lonely or a bit down and needed a friend. Ah, then there are *the quilts for love*. Those are something special. They take a long time because they are designed out of my head. I wait for the right inspiration and follow the moment.

Ouilts for love are the most emotional

Quilts for love are the most emotional. Will my intentions show? Will he even know that this quilt, this total creation is from the heart and not just some thing I slapped together in an evening? Kind of like the difference between opening the box of cake mix and creating a baked masterpiece that causes all that have a piece to moan with delight.

You may have seen one of these quilts on your journeys. It's the one that makes you tear up with emotion for all its beauty. The quilt that makes your heart skip a beat in its perfection. It calls to you to walk over and touch it, stroke the stitches and sends a chill up your spine. You sigh and wonder if you have ever

known such a love as the kind that made that quilt. The depth of it astounding you, causing wonder of how a quilt could move you so.

The quilts that are made in remembrance of someone or something are moving as well. Depending on why the quilt was made, it will take you back in time through the life of a loved one using either fabric from their clothing or photos, it could recount a traumatic event. It will mark history in ways that touch our hearts and souls. It can teach, remind or comfort.

Quilts and quilters are worthy of respect

Quilts and quilters are worthy of respect just as is a historian. The past is there for us to learn the lessons of our ancestors. Not to repeat them, to take their knowledge and grow as a people and evolve into a higher existence. Look at it this way; quilting didn't just pop into its current level of existence yesterday. It started out, I presume, as simple weaving. Moving through time into colors, patterns, designs and layers.

Wherever you are on your quilting journey and possibly self-discovery, *feel proud*. You are creating the conduit of your love and the person or people that receive it will know the depth of your love. You made it, and that is something worth far more than anything you could buy....

Reflections— **Cut Loose Curves with Elaine:** Cut loose and spend a weekend learning to cut curves free-hand with only a rotary cutter and mat. Piece them together to produce an original design, or create the background for an original work. No rulers, no measuring, no pinning!! Or, with minimal measuring (of only the original squares of fabric), you can also create blocks using cut-loose curves and explore the rhythm and movement that result from a variety of block arrangements.. If you love serendipity, then prepare to be surprised and delighted.
