Antique Quilts Finished

Several years ago I was asked by a friend to complete two antique log cabin quilt tops; one in mixed cottons and the other in fine plain, red, gold and royal blue wool. These quilt blocks had been carefully hand pieced on squares of muslin and stitched together almost 100 years ago by a seamstress great aunt.

We found just enough yardage for backing in an antique looking mini print, which picked up the wool quilt's colours, but nothing seemed quite right for the multi-coloured cotton blocks. Browsing through Sears one day I found two navy single size 100% cotton sateen (320 thread count) fate sheets on sale. The sheets were in a rich navy, with a bit of life, like some of the navy prints in the cotton log cabin quilt top. The fabric 'needled' well but I worried that the navy dye of the sheets when used as a backing would bleed into the quilt top.

'Quilt and Stitch' came to the rescue with 'Retayne' -a colour fixative for commercially dyed cotton fabrics. It is to be used before washing the fabric for the first time, or placing it in your quilt. Subsequent washing should be with cool water.

I washed the mustiness from the cotton top with 'Orvus' quilt soap in the bathtub and couldn't believe the brown colour of the water. Another hand washing and several rinses later the quilt top was bright and fresh. It dried quickly, lying on a large sheet in the shade in our back yard. Pressing the seams in preparation for the quilt frame was a challenge!

The navy cotton sateen quilted up beautifully and I had enough left from the backing to double bias bind both quilts. 'Retayne' saved the day!

This summer I was at two quilt shows, Napanee and Perth, and a variety of other fibre art shows. All were very enjoyable including a surprise visit to a lovely garden that I hope you know about. The Heritage Quilters' Guild put on a lovely show in mid May at the Napanee Strathcona Arena. There was an assortment of pieced and appliquéd quilts including several samplers. One was inspired by an Alias Grace book, as each chapter contained quilt blocks, many that Anne Dickson had not seen before. The result was her lap quilt.

Judy Vandyke made one of Greta Kristiansen New York Beauty designs, a stunning addition to the show. There were delightful snowman quilts, a gingerbread quilt, and a stylish cat quilt all wonderful eye candy. I hope you made it to the show ... I did run into many of you that day.

And of course, they had many vendors selling all that fabric and this and that's. Did I tell you I bought too much? Had a great day at the show!

The Lanark County Quilters were really happy to see so many Kingston quilters come to their show in Perth. They put on a large show with a wide variety of quilts including a room full of wall hangings from SAQA (Studio Art Quilt Associates Inc.)... original fibre art pieces. As Joan Legros and I had travelled in Ontario this summer, she had commented on how sumacs were everywhere you looked, including my own backyard. We couldn't get away from them, and there they were in Perth, hanging in the show, Catherine Timm's "*Winter Scene with Sumac*".

There were several Mystery Quilt Block of the Month quilts that were very different in their colours comparison an

interesting exercise. Equally interesting were several Delta Dawn Mystery quilts all very different using the same block patterns but emphasizing different pattern pieces through colour.





There were many colourful quilts, including several made from Japanese fabrics. Other quilts were made at shop workshops, while others were original designs including one broderie perse quilt made to look like a 200 year old quilt, primarily made by hand with some machine stitching on the piecing.

The whole show was put on a DVD to music that Sally Hutson says was *excellent*. Watch for a time when we can show it to you. I could say more, but for now I'll stop and talk about ...



Kiwi Gardens, just west of Perth, off Highway 7, provided us with yet more eye candy, this time with nature and garden art. I did not know about this 10 acre garden and nursery till Hilary Scanlon asked that perhaps we could visit while in Perth.

I only wished I had known about this beautiful place a few years ago. You know when you just have to get away for a few hours, go for a drive, and instead of stopping for coffee, you can go for a walk in the woods and see flowers, gardens, birds, and garden art. And all for free! If a particular plant catches your fancy, you can always purchase a perennial from Paul, the owner, who is also at the Kingston Market.

She Carves, She Scores!

Primitive images of native animals, produced by a traditional stamping technique, surround a vibrant green silk cottonwood tree in the quilt block for Equatorial Guinea, designed by Eva D'Amico in the spring of 2004. The challenge we faced was where to find an appropriate set of animal stamps to complete Eva's vision.

We searched far and wide. No luck. Finally, Esther asked volunteer and carver Elspeth Greer to create a set. The new dilemma: which medium to use?

Elspeth tried several different materials, without success. Like Goldilocks, she found some were too soft, while others were too hard. Necessity being the mother of invention, Elspeth found a uniquely Canadian solution to the problem. She carved the stamps from hockey pucks! The pucks were sufficiently durable for stamping the fabric, yet pliable enough for carving...just! We used her stamps to print these delightfully whimsical images of lizards, birds, snakes and turtles onto the block. Now that's a real score!
